1. OVERVIEW OF THE MARITIME SERVICES DIVISION

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Maritime Services Division is a specialized executive arm of the Ministry of Works and Transport. It was established to administer the provisions of the Shipping Act and other maritime national legislation and to implement the regulatory functions embodied in the legislation (*Appendix 1*). The more vital functions of the Division are those intended to ensure the Safety and Security of Life at Sea, the Safety of Navigation and the Protection of the Marine Environment from ship generated pollution.

The Division also plays a pivotal role in the development of the National Maritime Sector and represents the State's interest in shipping safety and security, general maritime and port development matters at International Maritime Organisation (IMO) conferences/meetings and acts as the implementation, monitoring and compliance authority for most of the State's obligations with respect to international maritime instruments (conventions, codes, protocol and guidelines) to which Trinidad and Tobago is Party (*Appendix 2*).

1.2 MISSION

To provide an efficient cost-effective Maritime Administration for Trinidad and Tobago; to ensure the safety and security of shipping; the prevention of vessel source pollution; and to facilitate the growth of the national maritime sector through the necessary regulatory, administrative, advisory and developmental framework.

1.3 OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Division can be summarized as:

- To ensure safety and security of Trinidad and Tobago ships worldwide;
- To ensure safety and security of shipping in Trinidad and Tobago waters;
- To ensure control and prevention of vessel source pollution in Trinidad and Tobago waters;
- To facilitate the growth of the national maritime sector through the necessary regulatory, advisory, administrative and developmental framework.

1.4 FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1.4.1 The Division's functions and responsibilities can be summarized as the following:

- ☐ **Flag State activities relating to:**
 - Registration and licensing of Trinidad and Tobago ships
 - Survey, inspections and certification of Trinidad and Tobago ships
 - Registration, examination and certification of national seafarers

□ **Port State activities:**

Inspection of foreign vessels calling at/visiting ports in Trinidad and Tobago, to ensure compliance with national and international standards. (safety, security and pollution prevention)

□ **Other Activities:**

- Control of vessels operating in the waters of Trinidad and Tobago.
- Establishment and maintenance of Navigational Aids (lights, buoys, beacons and Lighthouses) to aid in navigation.
- Issuance of notices to mariners on danger with respect to safe navigation
- Detention of unsafe or not seaworthy ships.
- Investigation of shipping accidents/casualties.
- The approval and monitoring of maritime training institutions conducting STCW (Standard of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers) courses.
- Issuance of Harbour Master's Certificates (Clearances) to vessels departing Trinidad and Tobago waters and maintenance of records of vessel arrivals and departures.
- Direction and supervision of matters relating to wreck and salvage
- Monitoring safe carriage and handling of dangerous goods and cargoes.
- Adoption and implementation of International Maritime Instruments (conventions, codes, protocols and guidelines).
- Advises the Government and Shipping community on maritime related matters.

1.4.2 The Division is also responsible for:

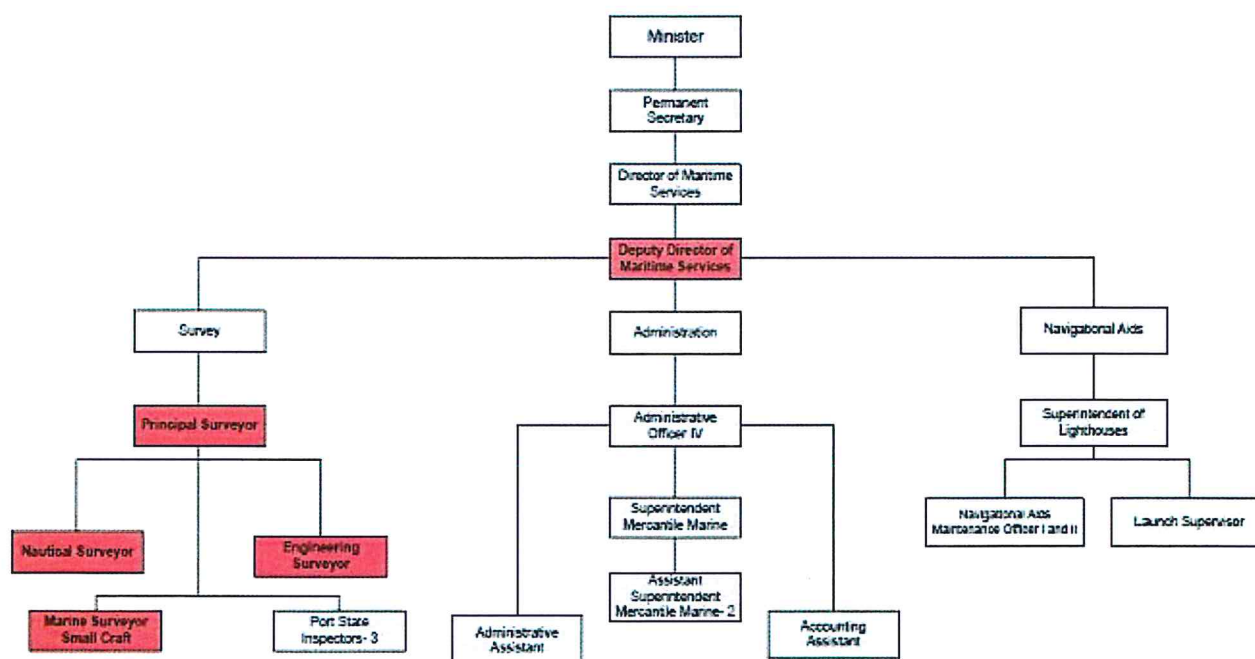
- (a) The conduct/coordination of relevant programmes and projects of the IMO relating to Safety and Security of Shipping, Safety of Navigation and the prevention of pollution from Ships which have implications for Trinidad and Tobago, and provision of technical input/advice into such programmes;
- (b) The continuous review, updating and development of national maritime legislation, and the review of international maritime instruments for accession by Trinidad and Tobago;

- (c) The facilitation of overseas training and professional attachments for the seagoing and shore-based shipping and port community;
- (d) Serving on committees to advise and assist government ministries, and other maritime clients and associates (*Appendix 3*) on maritime related matters; and
- (e) The development of policy and programmes to assist in the development of the national shipping industry.

1.5 STRUCTURE

To carry out these functions and responsibilities, the Maritime Services Division is divided into Sections, i.e. General Administration, Shipping/Seafarers, Survey/Inspection and Navigational Aids/ Launches. The chart below show the structure approved by Cabinet in 1988.

2. ACTIVITIES AND STATISTICAL DATA

2.1 ADMINISTRATIVE SECTION

2.1.1 Introduction

The Administrative Section provides the administrative support and services to the Division to enable it to carry out the following services:

- (i) Human Resource
- (ii) Finance and Accounts (Revenue and Expenditure)
- (iii) Registry
- (iv) Library

2.1.2 Human Resource

The Division continued to be plagued with frequent turnover of staff and an inadequate Staff Establishment that existed since 1988, resulting in the Division being understaffed for the volume and the quality of work required. This situation hindered proper workflows, inhibited continuity and delayed the implementation of work programmed, thus affecting the Division's overall performance. Due to the above, the Division has been functioning with employees comprising of contract, short term (3 months) and on-the-job-trainees.

There are sixty-seven (67) monthly paid positions on the Division's establishment, twenty-four (24) incumbent, eleven (11) acting and thirty-two (32) vacant.

Other employment in the Division includes:

(i) Contract Employment

Cabinet by Minute No. 2725 of October 11, 2007 and Minute No. 1580 of June 18, 2009 agreed to the employment, on contract, of the following nineteen (19) technical and professional positions in the Maritime Services Division. During the period under review, none of the nineteen (19) contract positions were filled. This was as a result of an exercise commenced by the Ministry of Transport to revise the organizational structure of the Ministry, which also included a Needs Analysis of the contract positions.

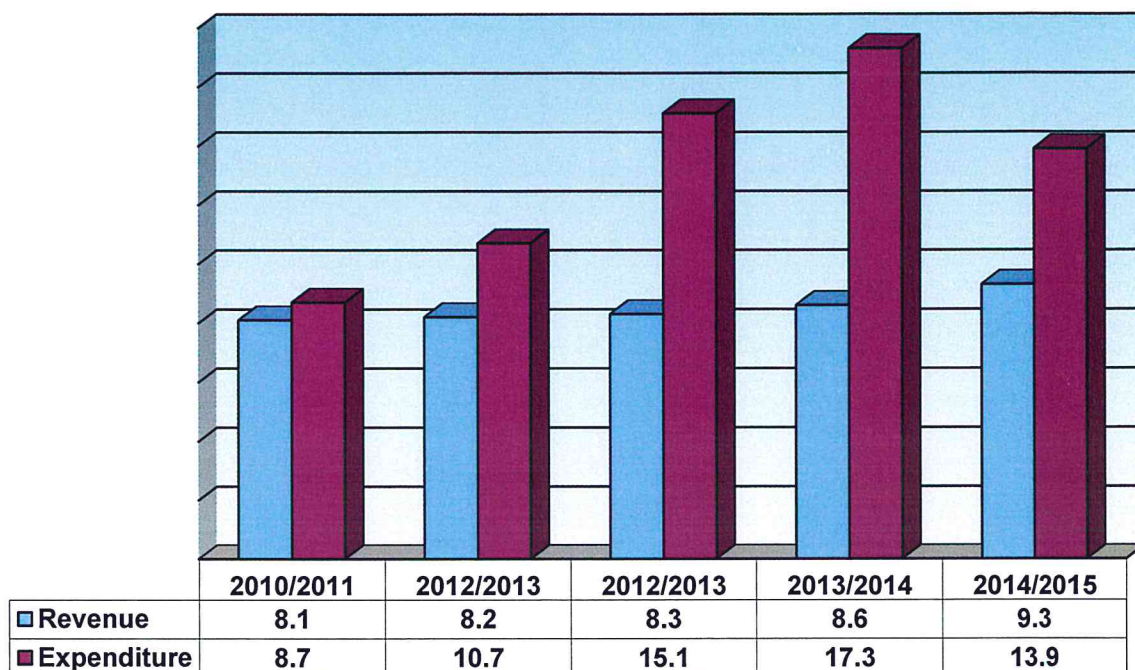
(ii) Other Employment

The Division comprises eighteen (18) short term employees, five (5) daily paid, five (5) on the job trainee and six (6) assigned employees. Total number of persons employed in the Division as at 30th September 2015 was sixty-nine (69).

2.1.3 Finance (Expenditure and Revenue)

The diagram below shows the Revenue and Expenditure for the period 2010/2011 to 2014/2015. Actual Revenue collected for 2014/2015 was \$9.3 million, representing a 13% increase from the previous financial year figures of \$8.6 million (*Appendices 4*). Actual Expenditure was \$13.9 million representing a decrease of 3.4 million over the last financial period (*Appendix 5*). This was primarily as a result of increase in security expenses; Vessel Traffic Management Information System payment; accommodation rental at Clarence House; and removal and disposal of Wrecks and Derelict Vessels.

2.1.4 Registry

A lateral mobile filing system was purchased in this fiscal year 2014/2015. This filing system would ensure that files from the Shipping and Seafarers Section be amalgamated with the main registry files.

2.1.5 Library

The Library was dismantled in September 2010. Shelving has been placed in the library; however, one of the constraints affecting the functioning of the Library is that there is no support staff.

2.2 NAVIGATIONAL AIDS AND LAUNCHES SECTION

2.2.1 Introduction

The Navigational Aids Section is responsible for the establishment and maintenance of forty-four (44) State owned Navigational Aids which include lighthouses, buoys, beacons, channel markers and leading lights (*Appendix 6*). The Section also ensures that privately owned navigational aids are installed and maintained in accordance with national and international standards. Notices to Mariners and/or Navigational Warnings (radio broadcast) are also prepared and promulgated by the section to ensure the safety of navigation.

2.2.2 Notices to Mariners/Navigational Warnings

During the period under review, (2014/2015) the Maritime Services Division promulgated fifty six (56) Notices to Mariners/Navigational Warnings to alert mariners of dangers to navigation or other activities, which may have affected the vessel routes.

2.2.3 Maintenance of Navigational Aids

During the period under review twenty seven (27) maintenance/service/repair exercises were conducted on Navigational Aids. Following the invitation of Tenders for the replacement of fourteen (14) buoys throughout Trinidad and Tobago in 2015, a contract was awarded to *Maritime Consultant (Trinidad) Limited* by the Central Tenders Board for the execution of the works. However, during the period under review, a formal contract was being drawn up by Chief State Solicitor and is currently being reviewed before final agreement is met. The execution of works is projected to be completed by August 2016.

Several lights (beacons) were unserviceable due to constraints such as:

- Lack of marine transportation
- Lack of air transportation (helicopters)
- Procurement procedures
- Other access related issues and missing lights.
- Lack of essential replacement parts.

2.2.4 Transportation

.1 Sea Transport (Vessels)

The Division owns two vessels (*ML Surveyor and Inspector II*) which are used for facilitating the maintenance of sea-based lights; transporting surveyors to conduct inspections in harbour and port areas; conducting safety patrols to ensure launches adhere to safety requirements; and for transporting personnel, food, fuel supplies to lighthouses stationed at Chacachacare accessible by sea.

During the period under review, no service/repair exercises were conducted on any vessel, the ML Inspector II which was dry docked in March 2014 and remains at that location. No major repair works was conducted on ML Surveyor, however, mechanical and fiber glass repairs remain outstanding since no approval and funding we received to undertake outstanding body and engine works on these vessels.

.2 Land Transport (Vehicles)

The Division had six (6) vehicles listed hereunder under its control during the period under review:-

- Toyota Hilux D/Cab Pickup - TDD 9657 (Nav aids)
- Toyota Fortuner - PCY 202 (Main Office)
- Nissan E26 Urban Mini Van - TDD 1078 (Surveys)
- Nissan Fortuner - TBL 2111 (Nav aids)
- Hyundai Terracan - TBU 4673 (Main Office)

During this time a Board of Survey was conducted on TBP 7648 and a recommendation was made for the vehicle to be auctioned. TBU 4673 which was taken to Neal and Massy for repairs was recovered from the company however, no repairs were conducted. It is envisaged that this vehicle will also be put up for a Board of Survey.

A Board of Survey is also recommended for TBL 2011.

.3 Air Transport

Eight (8) beacons accessible by helicopter have not been serviced during the period under review due to new Civil Aviation regulations which prohibited winching of personnel unless in extreme emergency.

2.3 SHIPPING SECTION

The main functions of the Shipping Section are the registration of ships and seamen; processing and maintaining records of ship arrival/departure; and the granting of Harbour Master Certificates (clearances) to vessels departing the waters of Trinidad and Tobago. The Section also deals with matters relating to Seamen's disputes and complaints. Vessels operating solely in the waters of Trinidad and Tobago and recording of Vessel casualties.

2.3.1 Vessel Traffic (Conventional/Non-conventional Ships)

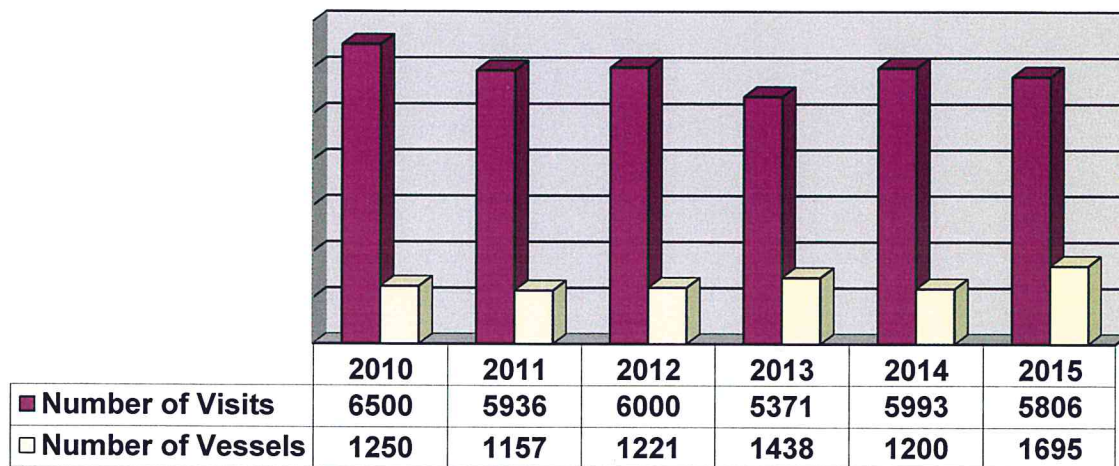
As at September 2015 the Shipping Section processed over 5,806 Arrival Declaration Forms resulting from ships calls/visits made by approximately 1,695 ships to Trinidad and Tobago ports.

The Customs and Excise Officers assisted the Division in processing departure Declaration

Forms and issued Harbour Master's Certificates (the granting of vessel clearances) at ports outside of Port of Spain, on Public Holidays and after working hours at Port of Spain on behalf of the Maritime Services Division.

The Table below shows the number of visits made by ships on international voyages and the actual number of vessels involved in the calls for the period 2010 to 2015.

2.3.2 Registration of Vessels

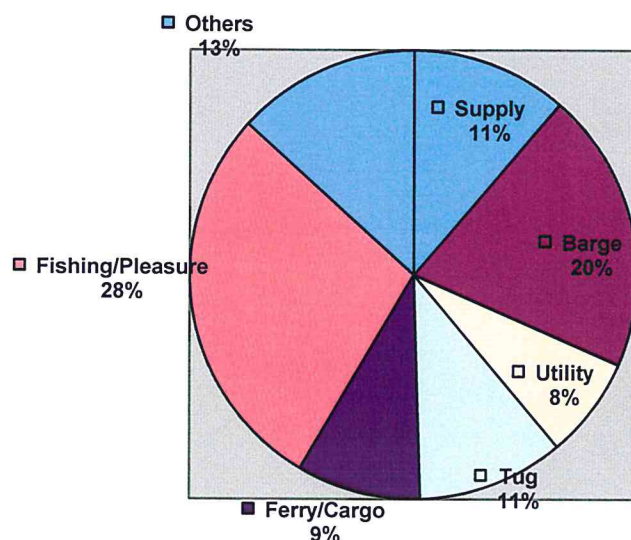


The Section is responsible for the registration of vessels (under the Shipping Act) 24 metres and above and those engaged in international voyages, under the Droghers Act as well as vessels below 24 metres (under the Motor Launches Act), operating only in the waters of Trinidad and Tobago.

.1 Registration of ships under the Shipping Act

As at September 2015, twenty-one (21) ships with a total of 3339 gross tonnages were registered by the Division as compared to six (6) in the previous period. The total number of ships on the register at September 30, 2015 was three hundred and one (301) with a total gross tonnage of 95747.90 (*Appendix 7*). A breakdown of types of vessels is shown below.

.2 Registration of ships under the Motor Launches Act

Five (5) vessels were added to the Motor Launch Register during the period 2014/2015 bringing the number of recorded motor launches on the Register to five hundred and ninety nine (599).

Due to the shortage of launch patrols, the actual number of inactive launches/vessels operating without registration licences is undetermined.

.3 Registration of ships under the Droghers Act

The Shipping Section is also responsible for maintaining records of ships operating as Droghers within the waters of Trinidad and Tobago. This operation involves the transporting of crew and equipment to offshore sites and conveying cargo between ports.

As at 30th September, 2015 the Division processed three hundred and sixty-eight (368) applications for the issue of Certificates of Droghers as compared to three hundred and eighty-four (384) in 2013/2014. During the period under review 63% of the two hundred and thirty-four (232) Certificates were issued to locally registered vessels and 37% of one hundred and forty-two (136) were issued to foreign registered vessels (*Appendix 8*).

2.3.3 SEAFARERS (Seamen)

.1 Registration of Seafarers

During the fiscal year 2014/2015 five hundred and nine (509) seafarers were issued discharge books and included on the seafarer's register. The total number of seafarers on the register to date is ten thousand nine hundred and thirteen (10,913).

.2 Certification of Seafarers

- ***Under the Shipping Act*** - During the fiscal year 2014/2015 the Division issued one hundred and eighteen (118) seafarers certificates comprising of Certificate of Classification, Certificate of Competency and Certificate of Proficiency in Survival Craft and Global Maritime Distress and Safety System.
- ***Under the Motor Launch Act*** - During the fiscal year 2014/2015, ten (10) Captain Examinations (Captain) were conducted for 76 candidates and five (5) Engineer examinations were conducted for 39 candidates.

Sixteen (16) seafarers were certified as Engineers of Motor Launches and issued Certificates of Competency. Two hundred and thirty (230) seafarers were issued with Renewals licenses as Engineers of Motor Launches under the said Act.

- ***Under the Small Commercial Vessel Regulations***

Seventy (70) seafarers were issued certificates as Boat Masters as compared to the thirty-three (33) in 2013/2014. Thirteen (13) seafarers were issued certificates as Boat Engineers.

.3 Casualties

During the period under review no casualties were reported to the Division.

2.4 SURVEY SECTION

The Section is responsible for ship surveys and inspections to ensure compliance with the national and international safety, security and pollution prevention standards. The Section is also responsible for the detention of ships, investigation of accidents/casualties and oil pollution incidents and examination and certification of seafarers.

In addition surveys of ships were conducted by appointed external surveyors on behalf of the Division.

.1 Flag State Surveys

During the period under review, surveys were conducted on ninety-eight (98) Trinidad and Tobago registered ships, to ensure that the ships were fit for their intended purposes. The surveys were conducted by in-house and external surveyors appointed by the Government and recognized organizations authorized by the Government to conduct surveys on its behalf.

.2 Port State Inspection

Trinidad and Tobago became a signatory to the Caribbean Memorandum of Understanding (CMOU) on Port State Control in 1996. This Agreement binds each Member State to take all practicable steps to eradicate sub-standard shipping and vessel source pollution in the Region. Trinidad and Tobago's obligation under the Agreement is to inspect annually, 15% of the foreign vessels calling at Trinidad and Tobago ports.

As at 30th September 2015, the Division achieved a 14% inspections rate, that is, inspections of two hundred and twenty- nine (229) foreign vessels. The accomplishment was as a result of the engagement of three (3) Port State Inspectors on contract.

.3 Deficiencies

As at 30th September 2015, thirty-seven (37) ships were found with a total of thirty-seven (37) deficiencies, most of which were for non-compliance with International Labour Organization (ILO) Convention relating to conditions on-board ships with respect to seafarers, lifesaving appliances, and lack of crew and ship safety certificates.

.4 Detentions

There were no detentions of ships over the period under review.

ACHIEVEMENTS

3 ACHIEVEMENTS

3.1 PROJECTS UNDER PUBLIC SECTOR INVESTMENT PROGRAMME (PSIP)

3.1.1 Vessel Traffic Management System (VTMS)

The Vessel Traffic Management System was approved by Cabinet in accordance with Cabinet Minute No. 2276 of 7 September 2006. The system is expected to complement and enhance maritime safety and mitigate identifiable risks associated with the development of the maritime industry. It is designed to improve the safety and efficiency of vessel traffic and to protect the environment from ship generated pollution. The shore-side systems range from the provision of Maritime Safety Information (MSIs) to ships, such as position of other traffic or meteorological hazard warnings, to extensive management of traffic within a port. The management and monitoring of ships will also include directing to anchorage to eliminate the possibility of abandonment. The project is undertaken in five (5) phases as follows:

During the period in review the consultant Eagle, Lyon and Pope was reengaged in January 2014 to recommence and complete the implementation accordingly. The reengagement was contingent on a suitable location to establish the VTMS Operations Centre. A preferred option was identified at North Post Maritime Radio Station (NPMRS). The work conducted by the Division is as follows:

- The Consultant completed the concept design and infrastructure specification. Additionally, the RFP was completed and bids were received for necessary equipment.
- Discussions were held with the Ministry of National Security to consolidate State's resources in providing an electronic radar feed from the National Coastal Radar Surveillance Centre (NCRSC). Approval was obtained from the Ministry in March 2015.
- Discussions were also held with representative of the Israeli company ELTA that installed the radar surveillance system for the electronic connection from the NCRSC.

- An assessment for suitability of the VTMS Operations Centre was conducted at the North Post Maritime Radio Station (NPMRS) and submitted on 1 June 2015. The Minister of Transport subsequently visited the NPMRS and agreed in principle to the facility being suitable for the establishment of the VTMS Operations Centre.
- Initial discussions were held with the Executive Vice President Strategic Alliance, Enterprise and Tobago Operations of TSTT for acquisition of the NPMRS inclusive of personnel, equipment and existing infrastructure.

3.1.2 Upgrading and modernization of Navigational Aids (Lighthouses, Buoys, Beacons)

Navigational Aids are essential for the safety of navigation in identifying safe fairways and channels for vessels. The State and by extension the Division has an international responsibility under IMO for maintaining navigational aids to ensure the safety of navigation. Cabinet granted approval for the repairs and refurbishment of 44 navigational aids owned and maintained by the Ministry. However funds were confirmed for the repair/refurbishment of fourteen (14) navigational aids (buoys). The work conducted by the Division is as follows:

- A Request for Proposal (RFP) was prepared in consultation with Central Tenders Board (CTB) and published.
- Bids were received by CTB for the repair/refurbishment of fourteen (14) navigational aids (buoys) and evaluated by a CTB appointed Committee and chaired by the Director of Maritime Services Division.

3.1.3 Raising, Removal and Disposal of Wrecks/Abandoned Vessels

Cabinet by Minute Number 1808 dated June 26, 2014 agreed to the raising, removal and disposal of twenty six (26) wrecks and derelict vessel which litter the approaches to the Port of Port of Spain, Claxton Bay, San Fernando and environs posing a threat to navigation and the marine environment at an estimated cost of \$20 Million.

A tendering process was initiated through the Central Tenders Board (CTB) to raise, remove and dispose of approximately forty six wrecks in the Port of Spain Harbour, Sea lots area and southern Gulf of Paria. Request for Proposals were prepared by the Division in consultation with CTB and published in the printed media in August 2014.

During the period under review Nine (9) proposals were received and evaluation by a Committee appointed by CTB and chaired by the Director of Maritime Services Division. A contract was awarded by the Central Tenders Board to Sea Neptunus Marine Services Limited for the raising, removal and disposal of wrecks in the waters off the Port of Spain Harbour and the waters off the Sea lots at a cost of approximately \$36-Mn (Vat inclusive). The Ministry of Finance allocated \$20-Mn for the project in 2015. The Division requested an additional \$16-Mn for the 2016 fiscal period via draft Cabinet Note.

3.2 RECURRENT PROJECTS

3.2.1 Primary Legislation

- **The Shipping Bill**

The redrafting of a new Shipping Bill, 2015 to replace the existing Shipping Act of 1987, was completed by Chief Parliamentary Council (CPC) in consultation with the Maritime Services Division of the Ministry of Transport. The draft was forwarded for the review of the Division and its Stakeholders before its finalization.

During the period under review an in-depth analysis of the draft (clause by clause) was commenced by the Minister of Transport. Meetings included technical officers of the Maritime Services Division and key stakeholders. On completion of the ministerial review, the Shipping Bill will be re-submitted to the CPC of the office of the Attorney General for consideration. The Bill provides for:

- the establishment of a Maritime Authority of Trinidad and Tobago;
 - consolidation and merging with the Harbours Act (Chapter 50:06);
 - the repeal of the Motor Launches Act and the Droghers Act respectively (to be replaced by regulations providing for under the Small Commercial Vessels and the Shipping Local Trade);
 - new provisions that give effect to amended international instruments (conventions, codes and protocols) ratified by the Government after 1987;
 - the establishment of a Vessel Traffic Management Systems;
 - the updating of provisions dealing with marine wreck, derelict vessels and abandoned vessels;
 - consequential amendments to the Port Authority Act (chapter 51:01) to clearly set out the jurisdictions governing ports and harbours; and
 - updating the maritime terminology and increasing fines and penalties in accordance with international standards.
- **Shipping Marine Pollution Bill** – This Bill, once enacted would replace the existing pollution legislation (*Oil Pollution in the Territorial Waters of 1951*). During the period under review, the Division has been following up on the status of the Bill which is under the consideration of the Office of the Attorney General. The Bill has been amended to incorporate provisions for the Ballast Water Management and Anti-fouling International Conventions which were ratified by Trinidad and Tobago in 2012. Continued drafting of the Bill has been placed on hold whilst the new Shipping Bill was given priority.
 - **Pilotage Act** – This Act of 1939 was reviewed and amendments recommended by the Pilotage Authority, chaired by the Harbour Master/Director of Maritime Services. The amendments reflect recent trends in commercial maritime growth and the development of port facilities to deal with international maritime traffic. These are included in:
 - *Compulsory Pilotage Area* – The Pilotage Authority reviewed and approved the recommendations of the Pilots Association for the creation of new compulsory pilotage areas and the revision of current areas - under the Second Schedule of the Pilotage Act. A submission was made to Cabinet and approval was granted via

- *Draft Policy Document and Amended Pilotage Bill* - The amended Bill and policy document were finalized and approved by the Pilotage Authority. The documents were submitted to the office of the Permanent Secretary for review and onward transmission to Cabinet for consideration and approval.

3.2.2 Secondary Legislation

- **Pleasure Craft and Fishing Vessels** – Currently there are no legislation dealing with the safety and security of pleasure and fishing vessels. During the period under review, *Draft Safety of Pleasure Craft and Fishing Vessel Regulations* were developed and presented to the Minister of Transport.

3.3 OTHER MARITIME PROJECTS

3.3.1 National Maritime Policy

Cabinet by Minute No. 1290 dated May 8, 2014 agreed to the development of a National Maritime Policy and Strategy for Trinidad and Tobago based on the Guideline provided by the International Maritime Organization (IMO). Cabinet also agreed to the establishment of an Inter-Ministerial Committee to develop the National Maritime Policy and Strategy for Trinidad and Tobago.

During the period under review the Division convened two meetings to apprise the members of the cabinet Inter-ministerial Committee of the Terms of Reference which was based on the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas and the IMO's Guidelines.

3.3.2 Transformation of the Division to an Authority

During the period under review there were no activities under this heading.

3.3.3 Search and Rescue (SAR)

The Division is awaiting the comments of the Member States of Barbados and Grenada with respect to the draft Multilateral Agreement.

3.4 COMMITTEES (Established under the Ministry)

3.4.1 National Task Force (NTF) on Ballast Water Management

Trinidad and Tobago was selected by the International Maritime Organization (IMO) in 2006, as a Lead Partnering Country in the region for the implementation of Ballast Water Management (BWM) GloBallast Partnership Programme, for a period of five years commencing in 2007. In 2012, the Government ratified the International Convention for the Control and Management of Ships' Ballast Water and Sediments (BWM Convention). The aim of which is to monitor, control and regulate ships' ballast water in order to prevent the spread of Marine Invasive Alien Species.

In keeping with the Convention, Cabinet agreed to the establishment of a National Task Force comprising of key stakeholders for the implementation of the GloBallast Partnership Project ending 2012. During the period under review, the following were completed:

- A Draft Cabinet Note requesting the approval of Cabinet to continue the GloBallast Partnership Project and the extension of the work period of the National Task Force for the Implementation of the project for the period 2012 to 2016.
- Delivery of a presentation on the status of the implementation of the Ballast Water Management (BWM) Convention in Trinidad and Tobago at the IMO's 4th GloBallast Partnership Global Project Task Force (GPTF) meeting held in Brazil in November 2014.

3.4.2 National Maritime Transportation Facilitation Committee

The Government ratified the international convention on the Facilitation of Maritime Traffic, the purpose of which is to facilitate maritime transportation by simplifying and minimizing the formalities, documentary requirements and procedures relating to the arrival, stay and departure of ships engaged in international voyages. In keeping with the Convention, a National Maritime Transportation Facilitation (FAL) Committee was established to ensure its implementation through electronic interface and to facilitate the coordination of regulatory requirements among relevant agencies.

During the period under review, partial implementation of the e-Maritime Services Module commenced, in collaboration with the Ministry of Trade and Investment. The aim of this module, the Single Electronic Window (SEW), is to facilitate the receiving and processing of information relating to ship arrivals and departures through TT-Bizlink.

3.4.3 Vessel Traffic Management System (VTMS) Team

During the period under review, there were no meetings of the Team since the tenure of the Cabinet Appointed VTMS Team expired in 2011. Cabinet by Minute 1703 dated 21 June 2012 advised on the reconstitution of the Team subject to the appointment of the members. However no Letters of Appointment were issued to the respective members.

A draft Note was prepared seeking Cabinet's approval of:

- the appointment and re-appointment of members and alternates to serve on the Vessel Traffic Management System (VTMS) Team.
- the appointment of a representative from the Ministry of Transport (Maritime Services Division) to serve as Chairperson on the VTMS Team

4. PROJECTIONS FOR 2015/ 2016

4.1 *PROJECTS UNDER PUBLIC SECTOR INVESTMENT PROGRAMME (PSIP)*

4.1.1 Vessel Traffic Management System (VTMS)

Confirmation of a location is required for further progress with the implementation of the VTMS. The NPMRS facility was considered to be suitable based on an assessment conducted in June 2015 and a subsequent visit by the Minister of Transport. Providing the facility is acquired it is intended to be converted from a radio station in its current configuration to the VTMS Operations Centre. The projection for this project is determined by the following:

- An arrangement is to be confirmed for the lease or acquisition of the NPMRS that will include personnel, equipment and existing infrastructure.
- The NPMRS facility is to be inspected for suitable configuration and the necessary work is to be contracted.
- Evaluate bids received for acquisition, installation and commissioning of necessary equipment.
- Select and provide training for suitable Radio Operators in accordance with IMO IALA (International Association of Marine Aids to Navigation and Lighthouse Authorities).
- Development of Human Resource Capacity and the employment of administrative and security personnel in accordance with the established organizational structure recommended by the consultant.

4.1.2 *Upgrading and modernization of Navigational Aids (Lighthouses, Buoys, Beacons)*

On 14th August 2015 a tender was awarded to Marine Consultants (Trinidad) Limited by the CTB. A contract is to be drawn up by the Chief State Solicitor to be signed by the Ministry of Works and Transport and the contractor. The Division will be responsible for supervising and monitoring the execution of the contract.

4.1.3 *Raising, Removal and Disposal of Wrecks/Abandoned Vessels*

A contract was awarded by the Central Tenders Board to Sea Neptunus Marine Services Limited for the raising, removal and disposal of wrecks in the waters off the Port of Spain Harbour and Sea lots area.

The Maritime Services Division will be responsible for:

- Supervising and monitoring the execution of the contract;
- Following-up on obtaining Cabinet's approval for the additional \$16-Mn in order to facilitate the continuation of the project; and
- Enforcing policy and procedures for the prevention and removal of marine wrecks in the waters of Trinidad and Tobago, once the new Shipping Act is enacted, which makes

provisions for wreck prevention and removal.

4.1.4 Acquisition of two Multi-Purpose Vessels

The Division currently owns and operates two motor launches (ML Surveyor and ML Inspector) which are used in the maintenance and servicing of Navigational Aids accessible by sea. The acquisition of the multi-purpose vessels would replace the existing 35 years old vessels, which have passed their economic life and are constantly incurring cost relating to repairs and maintenance.

Cabinet by Minute No 1413 dated May 2014 agreed to the acquisition of the vessels as an estimated cost of TT\$ 20-Mn. Draft Request for Proposal has been developed.

4.2 MARITIME LEGISLATION

4.2.1 Primary Legislation

- **The Shipping Bill**

It is anticipated that the ministerial review of the Bill will be completed within the financial period 2015/2016 and re-submitted to the CPC of the office of the Attorney General for consideration and onward transmission to the Legal Review Committee (LRC).

- **Shipping Marine Pollution Bill**

CPC is to recommence of the drafting of the Shipping Marine Pollution Bill.

- **Pilotage Act**

- *Compulsory Pilotage Area* – The Office of the Attorney General is to prepare the necessary order amending the Second Schedule to the Pilotage Act that relates to the Compulsory Pilotage Area. (*Cabinet Minute No. 1141, dated 14 May 2015 is relevant*).
- *Draft Policy Document and Amended Pilotage Bill* – To be forwarded to Cabinet for consideration and approval.

4.2.2 Secondary Legislation (Regulations)

- *The Shipping (Safety of Pleasure Craft and Fishing Vessels)* - The draft Regulations are to be redrafted to include the comments of the Minister relating to vessel construction provisions.
- *The Shipping (Training, Certification, Safe Manning, Hours of Work and Watchkeeping)* - The Regulations are to be amended to include recent amendments (2010 Manila) to the international Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping (STCW) for Seafarers.
- *The Shipping (Local Trade)* - Liaise closely with Chief Parliament Counsel to ensure the

passing of the National Regulations.

- *The Shipping (Small Commercial Vessel)* - Follow-up with CPC for the incorporation of the entire Small Commercial Vessel Code in the existing regulations.
- *The Shipping (Caribbean Cargo Ship Safety)* – Obtain comments on the draft regulations from the technical officers of the Division.
- Other Legislations

Pursue the finalizing of the twenty nine (29) Regulations to be enacted under the Shipping Bill and the eleven (11) Regulations to be enacted under the Marine Pollution Bill already forwarded to the Chief Parliamentary Counsel.

4.3 OTHER MARITIME PROJECTS

4.3.1 National Maritime Policy

The Cabinet appointed Inter-Ministerial Committee is to commence the development of a National Maritime Policy Framework based on Guidelines provided by IMO and the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas. This policy will guide and accelerate the development of the Trinidad and Tobago Maritime Industry. *Cabinet Minute No.1290 dated 8 May, 2014 is relevant.*

4.3.2 Transformation of the Division to an Authority

- Obtain Permanent Secretary's approval to re-engage the services of the Maritime Technical Services Jamaica (MTSJ) to further update and finalize the Business and Implementation Plans to reflect the current period. Upon approval, the draft contract which has been prepared in consultation with MTSJ, using the Extra Services Clause in the previous Contract will be submitted to the PS for consideration and further approval.
- Convene a meeting of the Cabinet appointed Implementation Committee which was reconstituted in 2013 via Cabinet Minute No. 1284, to review Plans and discuss the way forward.
- Follow-up on the enactment of the new Shipping Act that makes provisions for the Maritime Authority.

4.3.3 Search and Rescue (SAR)

The Maritime Services Division is awaiting comments on the draft Multilateral Agreement from Member States for the finalization and submission to respective Governments for approval. The completed Agreement will be submitted to IMO for a signing ceremony to formalize the arrangement.

4.3.4 Open Ship Registry

Follow-up with the Permanent Secretary on the way forward on the proposed establishment by Government of an Open Ship Registry (Cabinet directives via Minute No 195 dated January 26, 2012). The Minute specified the use of the Public Private Partnership (PPP) Model, however, PPP personnel subsequently advised that such model would not be appropriate for the Open Ship

Registry. A draft Cabinet Note was prepared by the Division and submitted to Head Office to rescind Cabinet Minute No 195 to exclude the use of the PPP model.

4.3.5 *IMO Member State Audit Scheme (IMSAS)*

Trinidad and Tobago Maritime Administration is scheduled to be audited by the International Maritime Organization (IMO) under the IMO Member State Audit Scheme (IMSAS) in March 2017. This Scheme is intended to provide Trinidad and Tobago, as a Member State of IMO with a comprehensive and objective assessment of how effectively it administers and implements the mandatory IMO instruments (conventions, codes and protocols) ratified by the Government.

The Division is to commence preparatory work in accordance with IMO guidelines and to consider engaging IMO to conduct a Mock (Preliminary) Audit to aid in achieving the objectives of IMSAS.

4.3.6 *Certification of Seafarers (Officers)*

Commence the process for obtaining recognition from the International Maritime Organization (IMO) to issue Certificate to seafarers (officers), thereby giving full and complete effect to the International Convention, as amended on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping (STCW) for Seafarers.

4.4 COMMITTEES

4.4.1 *National Task Force (NTF) on Ballast Water Management*

- Cabinet Note requesting the approval of Cabinet to continue the GloBallast Partnership Project and the extension of the work period of the National Task Force for the Implementation of the project for the period 2012 to 2016 is to be submitted to Cabinet for consideration and approval. The approval to 2016 will coincide with the term of the IMO GloBallast Partnership Project.
- The four (4) National consultancies/reports (Economic Assessment, Status Assessment, Legal Review and National Strategy) relating to the implementation of the BWM project are to be submitted to Cabinet for consideration and approval.
- Establishment of sub-committees (Research, Compliance Monitoring and Enforcement, Public Awareness and Legal) by the NTF in order to facilitate the Work Program as set out in the draft National Strategy.
- Training of Ballast Water experts from Trinidad and Tobago at an IMO sponsored Ballast Water Sampling and Analysis train-the-trainer Workshop in USA.

4.4.2 *National Maritime Transport Facilitation Committee*

- Full implementation of the E-Maritime module relating to vessel arrivals and departures in and out of the waters of Trinidad and Tobago. This is to be accomplished in collaboration with the National Maritime Transport Facilitation Committee and the Ministry of Trade.

- Submission of draft Cabinet Note to the Office of the Permanent Secretary relating to the amendment of the appropriate legislation to give effect to the International Convention on the Facilitation of Maritime Traffic (FAL).
- Continue the work of the FAL Committee in resolving issues related to the e- Maritime module (e-payment and utilization of the Single Electronic Window by other regulatory agencies) and further sensitizing and educating the maritime industry about the electronic system for vessel arrival, stay and departure from the waters of Trinidad and Tobago via Shipping Notices.

4.4.3 Vessel Traffic Management System (VTMS) Team

- Re-constitution of the VTMS Team to oversee the implementation and post-monitoring of the System for Trinidad and Tobago;
- Appointment of a representative from the Ministry of Transport (Maritime Services Division) to serve as Chairperson on the VTMS Team; and
- The grant of covering approval for prior meetings held to oversee the preparation and implementation of the VTMS system.

4.5 OTHERS MARITIME ACTIVITIES

4.5.1 Flag State - Ensure that flag State activities (registration, survey and certification of ships flying Trinidad and Tobago flag) are carried out in accordance with national legislation and international instruments (conventions, codes and protocols) ratified by the Government.

4.5.2 Port State - Ensure the achievement of 15% port State inspections on foreign registered ships visiting/calling at ports in Trinidad and Tobago. This is an obligation under the Caribbean Memorandum of Understanding (CMoU) on Port State Control which was signed by the Government in 1996.

CONSTRAINTS OVER THE FISCAL YEAR (2014/2015)

5. CONSTRAINTS OVER THE FISCAL YEAR (2014/2015)

5.1 ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The organizational structure is not in sync with international best practices. In addition the Staff Establishment in accordance with the Draft Estimates of Expenditure has not changed from that of 1988 when the Division was established. The structure did not cater for Legal, Shipping, Accounting and Research Sections.

In addition, the Maritime Industry continues to evolve and therefore must keep pace with international best practices. Job specification/description of the public officers in the Maritime Division is outdated and requires a complete review by the Chief Personnel Office (CPO), for example the requirements for a Deckhand on a ship is a School Leaving Certificate, whereas international standards mandates that seafarers employed on board ship must receive appropriate basic safety training in personal survival technique; fire prevention and firefighting; elementary first aid; and personal safety and social responsibilities.

5.2 STAFFING

The Division continues to be severely hampered in the execution of its functions and responsibilities due to lack of sufficient and suitable staffing requirements. There also existed a number of vacant positions under the Public Service establishment as a result of the low and unattractive salary compensation package.

5.3 LEGISLATION

Lack of drafting personnel employed at the office of the Attorney General to review legislation submitted by the Division, resulted in the slow pace in up-dating of the Maritime Division's legislation. A Legal Unit is required to draft and develop national legislation in order to give full and complete effect to the IMO conventions ratified by the Government.

RECOMMENDATIONS

6 RECOMMENDATION

6.1 Transformation of the Maritime Services Division to an Authority to facilitate:

- Best practice organizational structure which will result in greater autonomy vested in the Authority to carry out its mandate;
- Financial self-sustainability by application of increased fees to more closely reflect the cost of service provision;
- Provide quality services to the local and international clientele relating to safety and security of life and property at sea and the protection of the marine environment from ship generated pollution;
- Increased capacity and improved efficiency;
- Greater enforcement of standards, i.e. safety, security and pollution prevention; and
- Recruitment of suitably competent and qualified personnel at competitive compensation packages, to carry out the regulatory and administrative functions.

6.2 Staffing

In the absence of the transformation of the Division for which provision is made in the Shipping Bill, it is recommended that competent and qualified personnel be employed on contract to perform the following activities, inter alia:

- Vessel Traffic Management
- Ballast Water Management
- Search and Rescue
- Wreck and Salvage
- Assistant Harbour Master Duties

6.3 Legislation

The Ministry of Transport should work with the office of the Attorney General to ensure that Maritime Legislation is placed higher on the Government's Legislative Agenda.

- b. issues relating to the treatment and final disposal of ship-generated waste (WCISW will conduct two inventories on port reception facilities and waste management systems in Trinidad and the Region), accordingly, the results of those studies should be considered by the Committee.
- iv. Define a programme of upgrading training and assistance for ship and short based personnel in relation to the requirements of the marine pollution prevention and compensation regime.
- v. Determine other necessary activities relating to the implementation of the marine pollution and compensation regime, including Trinidad and Tobago's participation in non-compulsory annexes to MARPOL 73/78.
- vi. Pursue other actions relating to the development of a regime of marine pollution prevention and compensation for Trinidad and Tobago.
- vii. Report to Cabinet on a quarterly basis.

3. The National Monitoring Committee on foreign Fishing and related matters

3.1 Terms of Reference

- i. To monitor the operations of all foreign fishing vessels in the waters under the jurisdiction of Trinidad and Tobago, including their compliance with the terms and conditions of access.
- ii. To monitor the characteristics of foreign fishing vessels, including the fishing gear, that use Trinidad and Tobago for transshipment and/or landings to ensure compliance with international rules and regulations and national policies, laws and regulations of Trinidad and Tobago.
- iii. To bring to the attention of the Ministry of Agriculture, Land and Marine Resources information on fishing and allied activities that may adversely affect the conservation and management of the living marine resources of Trinidad and Tobago.
- iv. To bring to the attention of Ministry of Agriculture, Land and Marine Resources information on fishing vessels that engage in Illegal, Unreported, Unrelated (IUU) fishing.
- v. To board and inspect vessels and/or undertake any other tasks falling under the purview of the said Committee.

- vi. To provide regular reports on its activities at least half yearly.
- vii. To propose operational procedures for the effective discharge of the Committee's Mandate for the approval of the Minister of Agriculture, Land and Marine Resources.

4. The National Maritime Transport Facilitation Committee

4.1 Terms of Reference

- i. To implement the national facilitation programme;
- ii. To review the maritime transport documents, regulations and requirements in place and develop and implement a national clearance policy; in that regard, the Committee will be responsible for deciding what standard forms will be acceptable to all local agencies involved in the processing of international shipping and for keeping facilitation matters under constant review with the ultimate aim of eliminating the high cost associated with delays at ports which are, in turn, passed on to consumers;
- iii. To review questions of policy in relation to clearance formalities applied to international maritime transport services;
- iv. To make recommendations for facilitating and expediting the movement of maritime traffic through local ports to departments, competent authorities and other organizations concerned with the national facilitation programme(s); and
- v. To keep the departments, competent authorities and other relevant organizations informed of significant developments in the field of international maritime traffic in so far as they affect operations into and out of the contracting government.

5. The Pilotage Authority

The Authority is responsible for the regulation of all matters relating to Pilotage of ships in Trinidad and Tobago waters, including the following:-

- i. licensing pilots for the purpose of conducting ships within compulsory areas as defined in the Act;
- ii. making Bye-laws;

- iii. determining the qualifications of candidates for pilots licenses and Pilotage certificates;
- iv. limiting the number of pilots to be licensed;
- v. ensuring the good governance of pilots;
- vi. providing for the punishment of any breach of bye-laws;
- vii. approving the training standards for pilots;
- viii. determining the method of conducting examinations for masters and mates applying for Pilotage licenses and certificates;
- ix. fixing the rates of payment for Pilotage services; and
- x. ensuring that investigations are conducted when there is an accident or incident involving Pilotage to determine the cause of the incident, and steps to be taken to prevent recurrence.

6. The Vessel Traffic Management System Committee

6.1 Terms of Reference for a Consultant

- i. To undertake a comprehensive study of Trinidad and Tobago's maritime vulnerabilities with regard to the safety of navigation, security and environmental protection
- ii. To identify/delineate Vessel Traffic Services (VTS) area(s) over which port information is to be provided and the proposed location of a VTS Centre.
- iii. To assess the benefit to be derived for national security from a VTMS
- iv. To report on any border/territorial issues that may arise with neighboring countries if a VTMS were to be implemented
- v. To analyze the need of all stakeholders and the logistics of information sharing through a VTMS with stakeholders
- vi. To recommend:
 - a. based on the identified vulnerabilities, the most appropriate traffic management solution in terms of:
 - ✚ active/passive traffic monitoring
 - ✚ management effectiveness and costs

- ✚ having real-time information sharing and collaboration capabilities among users responsible for the safety of navigation with Trinidad and Tobago
- ✚ possible integration of the recommended VTMS with existing systems
- b. an appropriate agency to operate and manage the VTMS
- c. A project scope to be used for the invitation of tenders for the provision of a tailor-made VTMS;

7. **Maritime Industry Development Committee**

7.1 Terms of Reference

- i. Monitor the implementation of all projects, outlined in the strategic plan for the Merchant Marine Industry.
- ii. Effectively and efficiently execute all projects directly under its jurisdiction as outlined under the strategic plan. Ensuring that all projects are completed on time and within budget.
- iii. Collaborate with other agencies that have sole responsibility for execution of projects as identified in the strategic plan.
- iv. Co-ordinate all projects that require multi-agency inputs.
- v. Source funding and Technical assistance for projects from sources external to government to supplement that provided by Government.
- vi. Account for all funds provided by Government or otherwise obtained.
- vii. Be responsible for timely completion of its projects, preparation of reports and budgets.
- viii. Advise Government on matters related to business development in the maritime sector.
- ix. Undertake other activities that are deemed necessary for carrying out its mandate.

8. Land Reclamation Committee

7.2 Terms of Reference

- i. To advise the Government on all matter relating to the reclamation of land;
- ii. To review the Master Plan and Land Reclamation Line previously proposed by the West Coast Master Plan Committee to determine the relevance of the master Plan;
- iii. In the case of the proposed Land Reclamation Line, to determine whether it will be environmentally sustainable, and whether it is likely to prejudice the present status of Trinidad and Tobago as a Archipelagic State;
- iv. To undertake the review of the Master Plan and Reclamation Line and submit recommendations for a Land Reclamation Policy and Master Plan, within six months of the date of commissioning to the Committee;
- v. To formulate and implement an appropriate management system to ensure expeditious attention to application for the reclamation of land;
- vi. To review all applications for licenses to reclaim land and determine in each instance whether or not a license should be granted; and
- vii. To address all instances of illegal reclamation of land and advise on action to be taken
- viii. Specifically the Office of the Harbour Master shall review the following:
 - a. The impact that reclamation would have on navigational safety;
 - b. The measures to be adopted to ensure that an acceptable level of navigational safety is maintained during and after the proposed reclamation; and
 - c. The measures to be adopted in order to minimize siltation of nearby marine areas which could result from the proposed reclamation.

9. Yachting Industry Steering Committee

7.3 Terms of Reference

- i. To monitor the implementation of all projects outlined in the Strategic Plan for the development of the Yachting Industry.
- ii. To ensure that all projects are completed in a timely and cost-efficient manner.

- iii. To liaise with Government Ministries and other relevant institutions for execution of projects as identified in the Strategic Plan.
- iv. To co-ordinate all project that require multi-agency inputs.
- v. To source funding for projects form sources external to Government to supplement that provided by Government.
- vi. To account for all funds provided by Government or otherwise obtained.
- vii. To advise government on matters related to business development in the Yachting Industry.
- viii. To undertake other activities that are deemed necessary for carrying out its mandate.
- ix. To exercise due care and act in a prudent and conscientious manner while ensuring that project activities adhere to standards of best practice, both within Trinidad and Tobago and the global Industry.

10. The National EBOLA Prevention, Information and Response Team (NEPIRT)

Cabinet by minute 2848 of October 9, 2014 established a multi-sectorial Team, The National EBOLA Prevention, Information and Response Team (NEPIRT) to treat with the EBOLA threat.

The mission of the team is to integrate and coordinate the employment of all available and accessible capabilities and capacities to prevent the incidence and spread of EBOLA and similar viruses in order to protect all persons within the jurisdiction of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago and be ready to efficiently respond to and recover from any such incidence or spread should that occur in the context of a regional response.

The Director of the Maritime Services Division was nominated to the NEPIRT.

Three Working Groups were established with particular leads and strategies:

- 1. The Response Strategy Working Group – Ministry of Health;
- 2. The Prevention Strategy Working Group – Ministry of National Security;
- 3. The Information Strategy Working Group – Ministry of Trade, Industry, Investment and Communications.

The Maritime Services Division, Ministry of Transport sits on the Prevention Strategy Working Group chaired by the Ministry of National Security.

Cabinet had previously agreed that the National Health Council, under the chairmanship of the Minister of Trade, Industry, Investment and Communications, hold discussions with the under

mentioned Ministries/body with a view to developing and implementing protocols which utilize Advanced Passenger Information (API) to identify persons of public health interest in order to prevent the importation of the EBOLA Virus Disease (EVD) with minimum disruption to travelers:

The Ministry of Health

The Ministry of National Security (Immigration Division)

The Ministry of Transport

The Joint Regional Collaborating Centre, CARICOM Implementing Agency for Crime and Security (IMPACS).

The Minister of National Security to ensure that the staff of the Immigration Division, Ministry of National Security is properly instructed to identify persons of public health interest based on their travel history and to immediately report same to Port Health personnel for follow up actions.

11. The National Heritage Committee of Trinidad and Tobago

A National Heritage Committee shall be appointed by the Minister of National Diversity and Social Integration to produce a draft National Heritage Policy for Trinidad and Tobago. The Committee will comprise representatives of stakeholder organisations.

Terms of Reference:

- (i) Draft a National Heritage Policy for Trinidad and Tobago that incorporates all elements required to inform the development of a sustainable national heritage agenda with particular emphasis on:
 - (a) research and development;
 - (b) status of existing heritage sectors (apply defined by sectors); and
 - (c) legislative framework for securing and preserving heritage assets for present and future generations;
- (ii) Coordinate and collate inputs from the wide cross-section of interest groups and stakeholders, so as to effectively inform the draft National Policy;
- (iii) Identify actions and programmes needed to secure, promote and conserve the heritage of Trinidad and Tobago;
- (iv) Identify synergies, intersections and interrelations in actions by various sectors to the heritage agenda;
- (v) Identify mechanisms for regional and international technical and other cooperation and collaboration through national heritage;

- (vi) Capture and connect various dimensions and strands of national heritage with other national agendas including heritage sites, underwater heritage, civics and patriotism, outreach and public awareness, engaging the diaspora and international community;
- (vii) Identify mechanisms for monitoring and evaluation of the integrity, value and potential of heritage elements to Trinidad and Tobago and to the regional and international community.
- (viii) Identify opportunities for the formulation and implementation of public outreach and education on national heritage and ways of enhancing, protecting and appreciating same; and
- (ix) Integrate sustainable development and economic activity into the promotion of the heritage agenda.
